

THE 'CATS' LOVED RONNIE

Dingle boy with a hot guitar

Two thousand screaming teenagers held up the programme at Larry Parnes' "Extravaganza"-which featured rock 'n' roll idol Marty Wilde-last Wednesday when an 18-years-old Dingle boy, Ronnie Wycherley, of 35 Haliburton Street, completed a threeminute spot in the star-

studded programme.

Ex-tugman Ronnie, with a little apprehension. stage at the Essoldo Theatre, Birkenhead, after the compere of the show said: "Larry Parnes has given many breaks to young people in his time and tonight he has invited a young local boy to entertain you."

Wearing a two-tone Texan jacket and a guitar slung over his shoulder, Ronnie nervously walked on to the stage, and swung straight into the first number with an Elvis Presicy inspired style.

His three minutes were constantly punctuated by acreams and shouts from hundreds of teenage girls, which were inten-sified at the least move of his body.

SMILING BROADLY

Larry Parnes-manager Marty Wilde, Tommy Steele and top-line entertainersother came from the theatre dressing rooms and sat on the end of the eighth row smiling broadly as he chewed his cigar, weighing up the possibilities.

Afterwards in the dressing room, Ronnie sat on the corner was 18 - years - old Jimmy of an arm chair and told the Tarbuck, of 76 Queens Drive,

Weekly News: "I was nervous. but it's only natural."

How did Ronnie get into the act? "I sent a tape recording to Larry Parnes a few weeks ago." he explained, "and I was asked to come here tonight."

Sure enough Ronnie went to he "Extravaganza" show on the Wednesday evening and the first question manager Larry Parnes put to him was: "Have you got guts.

Within 30 minutes Ronnie stood against the gold-coloured curtains of the theatre to make his first big public appearance.

He is a former pupil of Wellington Road Secondary Modern School, Dingle.

"BILLY NIGHT" IN LIVERPOOL

A Charity night, organized by Albert Wycherley was held at The Montrose Club in Liverpool on 4th December 1996 to raise funds for The Billy Fury Charity Appeal. Fans came from all over the country and the club, which holds approximately 500 people, was full.

The music was provided by Colin Paul and the Persuaders, The Dions, DJ Neil Hiley and Albert, who ended the evening with a set of Billy's songs. A local comedian did a spot (with a bit of competition from several unofficial local comedians in the audience) and the Master of Ceremonies was radio personality Frankie Connor.

The entertainment was of a very high standard. Albert received such an enthusiastic reception he did several encores and everyone sang along. The raffle was conducted by Frankie Connor and myself and we rounded up the evening by presenting the Wycherley ladies, Jean and Marie, with bouquets.

The dance floor was crowded throughout the evening and there was some pretty fancy footwork around. (Eat your heart out line dancers.) Everyone enjoyed themselves - the bar extension helped - and there was a real party atmosphere.

The proceeds, after all expenses had been paid, amounted to over £800. Albert shared this between The British Heart Foundation, Broadgreen Hospital Heart Unit and The Wavertree School for the Blind.

MILL HILL GATHERINGS


A number of people have been actively involved in "flying the flag for Billy" over the years, including regular attendance at the Mill Hill gatherings. We hope you choose to attend the regular gatherings which are always well supported and well run. We meet at his grave around 1.00pm on the Sunday nearest to his death (January 28th), the Sunday nearest to his birthday (April 17th) and once again in the autumn (end of September / early October). Any visitors to the grave are welcome to bring flowers and messages/cards to leave on Billy's grave. Charity raffles, Billy photos (and sometimes memorabilia) are usually available for the collector and about 40-50 genuine and very nice people just like to meet and talk about "their Billy". Except for extremely rare occasions, Billy's mum Jean Wycherley is always present and very approachable in terms of having her photograph taken, providing autographs and often anecdotes of Billy as well. Hal Carter, Billy's friend and Road Manager in the 50's and 60's and Danny Rivers, a rock and roll contemporary are often present and always like to talk about Billy.

Entrance cost to the hall is £1.50 per person and those attending usually bring finger snacks, cakes or biscuits for the buffet. Because this is a church hall, the conditions of the lease are quite strict, e.g. there is music (Billy of course!), but no dancing, it has to be vacated by 5.00pm, and recently a "no smoking" ban has been implemented by the keyholder of the hall. Obviously short breaks can be taken outside the entrance door, much as in the same way that workplaces require them to have them these days. Once again, whether you are an ardent Billy fan or just a 50's and 60's music lover who admires Billy and his music, along with many other of his contemporaries - thank you for your interest and we look forward to your continued support in the future and carry Billy's name into the Millenium.

DIRECTIONS TO MILL HILL

Come off the M1 at junction 2 onto the Great North Way (A1). About a mile down the A1 take a left turn along Holders Hill Road (B552). About a mile down the B552 you'll come to a roundabout called Holders Hill Circus. At the roundabout take a left turn along Devonshire Road which leads to Pursley Road. Approx half a mile down Pursley Rd you'll see a school and a bus stop on your left and Milespit Hill on your right. Turn right into Milespit Hill. The Cemetry entrance gates are on your right about a quarter of a mile up Milespit Hill. When you go through the gates turn left and go to the top of the cemetry. The memorial bench is on the left, and Billy's grave is on the right. To get to the Hall - Turn left as you come out of the cemetery, turn left at the bottom of Milespit Hill, take the first turning on the left when your in the main road (Pursley Rd). The Church and Hall are on the right as you enter Salcombe Gardens.

THE BILLY FURY BRONZE STATUE PROJECT

Liverpudlians and Billy Fury fans Peter and Lynda Keller came out of "The Sound of Fury" stage show last year with the conviction that, somehow, Billy had to be firmly put on the map at his birthplace. Other fans had, over the years, discussed the possibility of erecting a statue but it took the Kellers to "grasp the nettle". Roger Dove (City Centre Manager) and Phil Young (Press Manager-Liverpool Tourist Board) are supporting this project. Peter and Lynda have now put together information packages on Billy for issue to City Councillors.

The proposed full length Bronze Statue will cost many thousands of pounds and, subject to Planning Permission, could be located in any one of a number of proposed locations, possibly along the Albert Dock or inside a prominent building. Peter and Lynda have had a sketch drawn up, based on Billy "on stage" in 1960, and further sketches are planned, so that the fans may decide on the most appropriate pose. This is a difficult area given that everyone perceives Billy at his best in different ways and different times. Most people agree that the essence of on stage "Fury" must be captured in some way. Reputable sculptor James McLaughlin of Blue Coat Chambers in Liverpool has been requested to create the Bronze. A number of photographs were loaned to James from the Fan Club to assist with the preliminary sketch and the general concept of Billy's image. Updates on this project will be included in the Fan Club magazine.

Jean Prosser has opened The Billy Fury Bronze Fund, with Frank Bull (the originator of the Liverpool Lectern Project and Stone Fund Trustee) as fellow trustee. Contributions already have been received from fans at Mill Hill who bought items auctioned from the personal collections of Frank Bull, Ian and Sheila Alexander, Mo Dossa (Bristol fan) and Chris Eley plus items donated to the raffle by Billy's mum, Jean. COLIN GOLD - FURY'S TORNADOS

BECK THEATRE, HAYES, MIDDX - 14th FEBRUARY 1997

I attended The Beck with not a little skepticism and even more trepidation for, after all, for Billy fans this is hallowed ground. Although I didn't get to Billy's Beck gig (I was at the Sunnyside on the 4th December) I knew how special a night this was to be for all the many people present. In the event, for the packed house, it turned out to be a memorable and poignant occasion especially for some who were visibly overcome by this genuine and affectionate tribute to Billy Fury by Colin Gold & Fury's Tornados.

RUNNING ORDER

Instrumental by Fury's Tornados - Walk Don't Run and possibly Perfidia (sorry lads I wasn't concentrating at this point nice sound though). Just Like Eddie (vocal) - Intro only to Halfway to Paradise, then Like I've Never Been Gone (good version) - A Thousand Stars - Collette (both good) - Wondrous Place (nice arrangement with some good guitar touches) That's Love (realistic vocal) - Maybe Tomorrow (great version) Last Night Was Made For Love (nice) - I Will - That's Alright Mama (1973 style - great - could have done with more uptempo numbers such as Turn My Back on You) - Jealousy. was a surprise (brought the house down - didn't think Colin would make it but he did - made the heart pound) - In Thoughts of You (nice version) - In Summer with audience participation (nice try, didn't quite come off. The flip side I'll Never Fall in Love Again would have gone down a treat here). Do You Really Love Me Too - I'd Never Find Another You (really nice version) - Halfway (worked well) - It's Only Make Believe and in closing Forget Him (nice, tremulous treatment - very Billy - 'nice one' Colin).

The narration, including some statements from Colin and The Band and part of the Official Programme, contained errors; some excusable, some not. The flow of the presentation was slightly marred by the continual, but planned, stage blackouts between certain numbers but all these things have been noted and hopefully will be rectified. It was the opening night and although Colin and The Band were nervous, they managed successfully to create 'A Fury Experience' without attempting to be a carbon copy. The sound was reminiscent of Billy on stage in 1982, a 60s feel but modern backing; even the vocals were very 82 Billy in places.

Visually Colin looked good enough to convey much of the presence of 60s Billy, especially on occasions with upturned collar, eyes cast heavenward, one arm clasped in classic Fury pose. Perhaps a little more hip and hand movement, including Billy's hand clapping over each shoulder, might have added to the effect. Overall, it seemed to work from the sounds of appreciation from those present and just as importantly off stage Colin turned out to be a really nice, approachable guy without pretension. It was obvious too just how close the band had been to Billy; they were his mates and loved him and, like the rest of us, miss him more than a little too. This really is an 'Experience' not to be missed by Billy fans and lovers of 60s music allike.

Be there at The Beck on 2nd November - and any gigs in-between in the name of Fury.

Special thanks from the Fan Club to all at ASL (promoters) and especially Colin and Fury's Tornados for keeping Billy's name alive in a sincere and heartfelt way.

Look out for the forthcoming Channel 4 documentary.

INTERVIEW WITH COLIN GOLD FROM THE BILLY FURY EXPERIENCE BECK THEATRE, HAYES ON 14TH FEBRUARY 1997

Interviewed by Alan Thompson from Radio Matters UK Interview arranged by Jackie Clark

AT: Colin can I start by asking you how did you get involved in the role of Billy Fury?

CG: I applied to go on to Stars in Your Eyes. Never thought I'd have a chance. The auditions came back and I went up there and got the part and ever since then. Phone call from Chris ("CR" Raynor of The Band), went up and met the boys and it's all gone on from there.

AT: But when did you first get an interest in Billy's music? Obviously you didn't hear it first time round.

CG: No, when I was about 19 or 20 I used to like Elvis. I used to impersonate him as well you know, but the suit doesn't fit me any more. (Laughs) I've always sort of liked him. I used to compare the two. I've always had an interest but now I've sort of got to be his number one fan as they say(laughs).

AT: What did you think was special about Billy's music because obviously you must have heard a lot of it, and you say you were an Elvis fan as well but what was special about Billy's music?

CG: The range really. I mean we done a club a few weeks ago and a gentleman came up to me after. He said I never knew anything about Billy Fury he said and when I'm walking out I know everything about him now. So it's the songs, they change so much. One minute it's a rocker and then it's a ballad. It's like a good comedian, you can have then laughing and crying one minute.

AT: But when you go in on stage as Billy Fury is it like assuming somebody else's persona when you go out there you're being that person?

CG: When I put that jacket on and the collar turns up it's you know it's spooky in a way. We've done some bookings and we've walked out and they've been screaming, and I've thought Oooh, you know it's a bit hard to take in but tonight's going to be the one, this is the main one.

AT: When you've performed before as Billy Fury how do you find that people react because obviously older people remember Billy the first time round, younger ones are perhaps hearing his music for the first time; what's the reaction from the audience like?

CG: Well as soon as we play the second number 'A Thousand Stars' as soon as we play that we've got them. It's like all the memories come back and they're all cheering and from then on they start shouting out the songs they want to hear, which is mostly 'Halfway to Paradise' but we do that last. It's like going to the fairground, you have the bumpers at the back so all the kids have to walk through. We do 'Halfway to Paradise' last and we lock the doors so they can't get out anyway. (Laughs)

AT: Do you have any particular favourite Billy Fury track yourself?

CG: I like 'Like I've Never Been Gone' and the boys do a version of the Elvis Presley Mama (asks is it called Mama - a voice says 'That's Alright Mama') That's Alright Mama. Billy used to do that with them live and I like the way they do it. It's a different arrangement and you have to sing it like Billy did it and not like Elvis. It's good. They're all good numbers actually. The hour for me goes too quickly. It does go too quickly.

AT: The persona we were talking about, assuming the persona of somebody else, the movements and everything that goes with it, did you study Billy on video and film?


CG: When we were rehearsing Chris used to say Billy used to do that and I used to say "Do what?" Like drop my hand, I never knew that I was doing it and when I went to Stars in Your Eyes they videod me but it's come a long way since then. I've had people send me video tapes and mostly it's the top half of his body that moves, which is the result anyway because I can't dance. But I like to think I've got him off to a fine art but you can never replace that man. I think I've got as good as I can get without tripping over. (Laughs)

AT: What would you like to do once The Billy Fury Experience has done the rounds so to speak, what would you like to do? Would you like to continue more Billy Fury work or a show like this in the future?

CG: I really think that this Billy Fury Experience on the scale that we're doing it, because no other band is doing it on this scale, there's a few tributes about you know that are small but the boys have put a lot of time and money into this as well, so have the promoters, but I think this will run for a good 4 to 5 years and even in America you know I'd like to see it go to America because he's got a big following over there as well.

AT: Colin thank you very much for taking the time to talk to us on this occasion.

CG: It's a pleasure, thank you very much.

My daughter and son grew up more or less immune to their mother's minor excentricities although my daughter Jo was once heard to admit that Billy was "cute" and my son David, during his spell as a bass guitarist with a Heavy Rock band called "Mutation Zoo", listened with approval to "Bye Bye" and announced "Yeah, I'd have him in my band". Praise indeed!

On another occasion, while I was playing "The Twist Kid", I sneaked up on David and one of his Neanderthal mates, doing the Twist in the hall. Their "street cred" was destroyed forever.

I now have a five year old foster daughter, Rebecca, who's obsessed by the telephone. She rushes to answer it before anyone else gets there first. Rebecca's recently discovered my video of "I've Gotta Horse" and she's besotted. We're treated to an enthusiastic rendition of "I Like Animals" at least five times a day. What she lacks in tonal quality she makes up for in volume.

When my four year old granddaughter saw one of my Billy tee shirts she said "What's her name gwan? Is she a boy or a girl?" You'll learn babe. You'll learn!

The Lectern was placed in Liverpool Anglican Cathedral in November 1993 by the Stone Fund and accepted by the Church Fabric Committee. There was a choral and dedication service and a melody of Billy Fury's hits were played on the magnificent organ in the Cathedral. Refreshments were served after the service to family, friends, fans and all present who helped donate money to help pay the £2,000 needed for a Lectern. £1 000 was donated by Decca Records in gratitude for his long and devoted associated with them The Lectern can be seen in the choir area of the cathedral. The name Billy Fury is carved on the top of it but it is not very clear. We are hoping to have it re-embossed in gold leaf or black letters so it can be seen more clearly.

Many thanks also to Pauline Barker for contacting all the radio stations and helping to promote Billy and the Fan Club. Well done.

All the best to Lynne Appleby who works tirelessly for Billy and we hope things are a little better now after recent events.

A Joe Meek fan claims that he saw Billy recording with Joe Meek during 1966 - watch this space. Billy's version of 'A Thousand Stars' (written by Eugene Pearson of the Rivileers) superior to any other but check out the great (stereo) version by Arthur Alexander on his fine MCA CD "You Better Move On" MCD 30493. Great voice, influenced the Stones and Beatles, sadly passed away recently following the release of a fine country orientated CD. Original version, doo wop style, was by the Rivileers (if someone finds a copy in any form please contact yours truly, I've lost mine). Visiting Blackpool? Then stay with Billy Fans (and really nice folks) Ian and Sheila Alexander at the Allendale Hotel, 104 Albert Road - sample the 50s/60s bar with its Billy display! Billy's mum Jean intending to contribute, in Billy's name, to

a Bird Sanctuary - more details to follow.

US Rock n Roll and country legend (and true gentleman - a rare breed!) Narvel Felts likes Billy's early recordings, praise indeed. If you like high voiced performers, and 'Country Soul', plus Rockabilly and some great 60s pop (Little Miss Blue/I Swear by the Stars Above) - check this guy out!

Great new book by Spencer Leigh and John Furminger covering Britpop 1955-62 - nice section on Billy - ordering details elsewhere in the magazine - buy it - it's an easy and entertaining read (see review).

One of the greatest (and oft repeated) misconceptions, "before the Beatles there was nothing"; the other ridiculous one being "Elvis did nothing worthwhile after he joined the Army" - utter baloney, say I!

Had a nice chatty letter from Moya Gleave of the New Zealand Billy Fury Fan Club offering support for the Bronze Fund - nice one Moya - thanks!

Congratulations to my old friend Gordon Watson for running the 'Yo Frankie' (Dion) Fan Club successfully for 6 years now, great little mag and new double CD out now containing R and B version of "Johnny B Goode" (Billy's closing concert number of the 1980s) and "Too Much Monkey Business" (pity Billy didn't cut that!). Gordon was kind enough to feature an article for me in 'Yo Frankie', comparing Billy to Dion - two greats.

Welcome to all fans, new and old, including Peter Baldia from Vienna who is being kind enough to allow me to contribute (and any other fans with rarities previously unknown about) to his International Discography on Billy. Information from Record Companies is sparse so it can only be built from the knowledge

Rock Star Records apparently have a tape of Billy 'live' on Boy Meets Girl singing "Turn My Back" & "Baby Let's Play House" (great Elvis number). Copyright problems (as usual) seem to be preventing its release at this time. Such a pity that all parties involved in situations such as this can't all compromise for the benefit of Billy and the fans. reflection on Rock Star who just want to put it out.) Surely as long as it's not sub-standard or, if it is, if it has historical merit, it should be released before we're all too old! "Halfway to Paradise" (Britpop 1955 - 1962) by Spencer Leigh and John Firminger

The format of the book is partly a selection of cuttings from the musical press and partly extracts from interviews undertaken by Spencer over the years with a whole range of people who share their comments, opinions, memories and anecdotes with us.

It's informative, nostalgic without being sentimental and sometimes hilariously funny. Did you ever wonder what was the real reason Johnny Kidd wore an eye-patch or how David Whitfield hit those high notes? Believe that one if you dare!

There's a whole chapter devoted to Billy. The press cuttings contain the usual inaccuracies but we're used to that aren't we? Many of the interview quotes are very poignant, some bring back happy memories and one or two will make you want to hit the interviewee over the head with a blunt instrument!

The book captures the spirit of a unique period in British pop music. It should be as enjoyable to those of you who were a twinkle in some Teddy Boy's eye at the time as it is to those of us who lived through it all. The personalities who dominated our adolescent years come to life again in these pages. We'll never see their like again.
