

PENNY LANE FESTIVAL

The festival was held on 21st June in Liverpool University Halls of Residence, Carnatic House. It was intended to be mainly a Beatles convention but it was extended to cover other aspects of Merseyside music. The organiser offered the club a stall and he very kindly waived the £50 fee. He may have regretted it because our little stall became the The other stalls, crammed with Merseyside centre of attention. memorabilia did a steady trade but we were like Mecca. Jackie, Chris, his lady Linda, Clare and myself were in attendance. We hung some lovely photos of Billy on the wall and we set out our display of tee shirts, photos, poems, Chris' potted biography of Billy and fan club information. A lot of people just wanted to talk to us about Billy and ask about the club. Many old friends were there and we made some new ones too. A lady called Yvonne who worked with Billy in Joshua Harris' all those years ago showed us some letters he'd written in 1959. They're among her most treasured possessions. Frankie Conner with his retinue from Radio Merseyside graced us with his presence and rooted himself to our stall signing autographs and distributing his mug shots to all and sundry. Frank you're gorgeous - especially in those new 'specs. Albert turned up in short pants, flashing his legs. He did change into more conventional attire for the evening though.

Paul Pierot brought a TV crew along to film for the BBC documentary about Billy to be shown later this year. Unfortunately by the time they got round to filming we were packing everything away and we'd taken down all the photos of Billy. All that was left was a poster of Albert so they filmed that.

The organiser had hired a coach to take people around the city on "The Beatles Heritage Trail". I'd given him details of "The Billy Heritage Trail" and he arranged another coach to take people round on that too.

Pete Keller took us to Tom Murphy's house to see the maquette of the Bronze. We were very impressed

We had music throughout the day and evening right up to midnight. The bands were modelled on the Merseyside groups of the sixties: The top of the bill "The Fab Four" were excellent. We'd arranged for Paul Neon to appear to do a tribute to Billy. Paul did two sets, the second one consisting entirely of Billy's songs and the audience loved him. After his second set they yelled and clapped and screamed for him to come back on. He was followed by "The Fab Four" who were very amused and

good natured about it. The singer said "You don't want us, you want Billy don't you?" Everyone roared "YES!" Later in their set they tried to get some audience participation in "Hey Jude" but without much success till they said "Sing if you love Billy". We nearly took the roof off!

It was a very enjoyable day and a good PR exercise for the fan club. If we're invited to take part next year try to come along, bring a friend, bring the family or just bring yourself.

A special thanks to everyone who made it to the Penny Lane Festival. If it wasn't for the Billy Fans it would have been a washout. How nice to be able to go on the first Billy Heritage Tour, and a good job we finally got to the right school! The Tour Guide was a nice guy and both the Beatles and Billy Tours are now combined in part, so US and Foreign visitors will always get a little Billy along with the Beatles; and quite right too!

Paul Neon put on a good show for the BBC cameras and the Beatles band, the FAB 4 were absolutely superb. Thanks are due to Maureen for being a prime mover of the weekend and to Clare for lugging so many Tee shirts all that way! Regrettably Billy's Mum couldn't attend due to illness but we hear that she's ok again now. Albert did attend. Johnny Gentle performed a live set, apparently the one he did with the Beatles as backing band in 1960, and the Undertakers were good. I was privileged to meet a really nice guy, Robin (surname escapes me) from Liverpool 60's band Robin and the Ravens (1 think). It would be nice to have this type of gathering annually, great music and a chance to dance and socialise properly.

We were privileged to visit Tom Murphy's beautiful house and view the miniature statue which is now superb.

A couple of minor mistakes were made in the singles / EP discography; these will be remedied when we produce it as a booklet. Also Billy lived at 34 Haliburton Street not 18.

We shouldn't lose sight of the need to continue to fight the awful disease that took Billy, that should continue concurrently with the Bronze and once its up, and all of the unreleased tracks and film clips are available, people will be more inclined to devote all of their efforts towards that and related causes. People, not necessarily only the Fan Club, obviously won't rest until they can hear all of Billy's works on CD, and see a decent compilation video of him. It's long overdue.

The problem is the financing of course.

Please send completed forms to the main Fan Club address. Only so many people can actually get into the 'Legends Bar' but there is an opportunity for more fans to gather for Jim Brady's 'bash'. This is on 17th April the night before the next (April) Mill Hill gathering (details elsewhere in the magazine).

The Fan Club is in a funny position, too big for very small venues but not currently big enough to finance a large scale Tribute Weekend, or guarantee filling it with genuine fans.

A special thanks is due to young dedicated Fan Teresa Illingworth, for her contributions of cuttings etc for the magazine, and for young Helen Deiga (Aged 13yrs) who sent her pocket money in for the Bronze! Also everyone else who sends in photocopies, information etc.

Long term Fan and friend Roy Harvey of Kent has sent me information on a computer pack, Billboard Music Guide Soft Key NO-BLM 344 AB-CD ROM http.ll www. MUSIC MATCH. COM which mentions Billy. Its a U.S. product marketed here and will quite frankly, put the backs up of all Billy Fans. Constructive criticism I can take, Billy was not perfect but totally wrong information about track listings etc is inexcusable from a professional product. There is a good review of the 'Sound of Fury' + 10 CD but the comments about Billy by one Ritchie Unterburger (you couldn't make up a name like that!) are out of order, following the old line about how bad pre Beatles British Pop was. By the time you read this I will have written to the Distributors requesting that the information at least, is put right. Ignorant opinion I can't do anything about; see how the National Press often mistreat Elvis!

EPs are listed as albums, with no track listings and the LP 'Billy Fury' with 22 B sides was released in 1963 being Billy's best selling album, I think not!! Nice to think that some kids in the US/UK might discover Billy via this package though. Nice to see another Internet web site on Billy, which was apparently the first one from long time Billy fan Harry Whitehouse, http://freespace.virgin.net/harry.whitehouse/fury/fury.htm. Why aren't you in the Fan Club Harry?

A genuine tribute with a couple of mistakes, but then Nalle, Maureen and I have probably got a few mistakes in our Web Site story too, and I did get a few things wrong on the Sound of Fury + 10 CD notes that I helped John Tracy with in '88. There was so much mis-information about Billy put out by Larry Parnes, without need, that sorting the fact from fiction is a nightmare, even today. Sadly, there is no way now that much of it can be confirmed.

The Decca session sheets show the Tornados doing a live version of 'Telstar' in between Billy 'Beat' and 'Ballad' sides of 'We Want Billy' but Clem Cattini can't recall doing it. Can anyone present at either of those 1963 recording sessions recall it; if you were there please write in anyway to me and tell me what it was like. There are several Joe Meek fans in the Billy Fan Club and this 'Telstar' issue is important to them. Session sheets can be wildly inaccurate, as I've found to my cost. I need to find session sheets for the Parlophone recordings, can anyone please help, EMI are unable to! John Lennon's long lost, sister was an Elvis and Billy fan apparently!

A picture of Jason Eddy (Albert) surfaced in the Diamond Records advertising magazine recently (signing up with Joe Meek). Some 24 or 25 BBC live radio sessions have been found during research for the Documentary, that includes 8 shows that the Fan Club knew the BBC had and which we are hoping can be released before we need our zimmer frames! The Southampton Rock 'N' Roll Club hope to have a Billy 'bash' in the Spring of '99.

Some nice CDs to pick up, 'The Original Johnny River's', Disky TO 886252 (includes the lovely 'Summer Rain') and 'Johnny Rivers in Action' / Changes' on BGO CD 355 ('Cupid', 'Moody River' and his version of 'He Don't Love You, Like I Love You'from Billy's 'Halfway LP). Rick Nelson 'Bright Lights and Country Music' / Country Fever' on ACE CD CHD 670, nice version of 'Welcome to My World' 'Hello Walls' 'Mystery Train' etc; the forerunner to the

Eagles style. Billy told Marty Wilde that the Eagles were going to break big internationally, some time before they did. Perhaps he would have forecast the success of the Mavericks too, great album 'Trampoline' MCA UMD 80456; the vocalist carrying on the Roy Orbison tradition.

'The Very Best of 'P.J.Proby' EMI GOLD 7243 496179 26, includes the nice 'Don't Worry Baby', and the great track 'I Can't Make it Alone'

A great series from EMI Budget includes Johnny Burnette's 25 Greatest Hits. Check out 'Sweet Suzie' a new one on me and his great versions of 'Walk on By' 'Girl of My Best Friend' 'Clown Shoes' and 'It's Only Make Believe' (not up to Billy's version, but nice). A truly great voice. Something that should be done on Billy, a <u>complete</u> career anthology, is what Del Shannon has been subjected to. Nice double CD spanning his whole career, including his version of the Boxtops 'The Letter'. Worth having but a bit pricey, shop around until you hit the below £20.00 mark (RAVEN RVOD-51. Australian Import). Most of Dels output is now available, either in double CD or 2-on-1 format. Bobby Vee 2-on-1 CD's now starting to appear.

Three 'new' Billy CDs, 'The One and Only' (K Tel) Pulse PLS CD 279 (nice picture but the wrong way round I believe), 'Halfway to Paradise' QED 274 (limited availability) - picture wrong way round on the back cover! 'Also Halfway to Paradise' Hallmark 309172 (lovely '65/66' plc cover but only 18 K Tel tracks). Recent Tom Jones biography accuses Cliff, Adam and Billy of being 'bland! Tom is an immense talent sure enough but either he (or his biographer) can never have caught Billy on stage or even played 'We Want Billy'! Where do these people get their ideas and beliefs, certainly not on this planet.

The Gamblers recorded 'Find out what's happening' and Billy also performed it live with the Gamblers. It's worth checking out the Elvis 1970's version on the great new CD, RHYTHM AND COUNTRY. 18 alternative tracks including great versions of 'Loving Arms', 'You Asked Me To', 'Good Time Charlie's Got The Blues', 'Promised Land', etc. 'Three Corn Patches' always was a turkey and is the one track to be avoided here, As for the rest, 'ESSENTIAL ELVIS' (Sub title) indeed. Catch Joe Brown in Concert if you can, he seems to get better! Nice versions of Elvis's 'I Don't Care If The Sun Don't Shine' and 'Mystery Train' (with beautifully accurate replication of Scotty Moore's guitar breaks, courtesy of Neil Gauntlet). We do tend to take Billy's old friend for granted, and we really shouldn't. A poignant version of I'll See You In My Dreams' was an implicit reminder of Joe's sad loss. An immense and underrated talent-support him when you can. Please note that the views expressed in this column are my own and do not necessarily reflect those of the Sound of Fury.

I look forward to seeing old friends (and new ones) at Blackpool, and all of us at the Sound of Fury wish you all the very best for the Festive Season. Don't forget. Wherever you are play 'My Christmas Prayer' over the Christmas and request it from your local Radio Stations. Take care, be happy, be healthy, and share Billy, don't keep him to yourself 'New' people are discovering him every day, and the youngsters are the ones to keep Billy's memory and music alive in the future.

THE ROCK BOYS AT HOME

"MR. Parnes-shillings-and-pence" is the way in which they often discourteously refer to Larry Parnes—the man who rocks the rock 'n rollers to the top.

Says the slick discoverer of stars such as Tommy Steele, Marty Wilde: 'I get it all the time. I didn't like it at first. Now I just grin and bear it. Why should I worry?''

Why should be indeed? For here is a man who does more—certainly not less—than any other successful agent. He boosts his clients, nurtures them, makes them what they are then takes his cut.

In Kensington, London—where he keeps a sort of home-from-home with a cocktail and canapés touch for his brood—the atmosphere gets electric when the easy-going Parnes is accused of exploitation.

"Ask any of them—and they'll tell you if they think I'm robbing 'em," he says. It can be recorded that none of his rock brood—Marty Wilde, Billy Fury, Vince Eager, Duffy Power, Dicky Pride, or the

newest, Johnny Gentle—think such a thing.
"I'm very grateful to Mr. Parnes," says
Gentle, "for giving me a wonderful chance."
"He knows what is right for us and what

we should do," adds Fury.

Parnes does far more than most ten-percenters in Britain. The lush penthouse he keeps is at the boys' disposal. For them, it's a kind of top class den where they can relax and spend their free time.

"Look," points out Parnes, "they've got everything laid on. Food, entertainment, a

pleasant atmosphere."

Parnes is looked upon by the rock 'n roll lads as a big brother. Carefully, slickly, professionally, he gives them know-how and—a fact which many of his critics prefer to forget—pay packets that a few months ago scarcely figured in their wildest dreams.

Perhaps, in the broad accents of Liverpool, Billy Fury sums up the general feeling best. Says he: "It's good, the life here with Larry, man. It doesn't cost us a penny."

ALBERT REMEMBERS

Personal Memories of Billy's brother Interviewed by Maureen Bowden

Back in 1955 when Billy and Albert were innocent little boys (Huh!) as a special treat they used to have cakes after tea on Sunday. Whether this was because they'd behaved so well during the week or whether it was bribery and corruption to get them to behave better the following week I'm not sure, but I can guess. Every Saturday Jean would bring home the cakes in a box tied with ribbon and it would sit in the kitchen till the following day.

Early one Sunday morning when their mum and dad were still asleep, Billy woke up feeling hungry so he sent Albert down to the kitchen to get the cakes. Albert, of course, wouldn't dream of refusing to do anything Billy asked so off he went and carried the cake box back to their bedroom. They scoffed the lot, then to add insult to injury they closed the lid of the box, tied the ribbon prettily around it and put it back in the kitchen.

Exactly what happened when the box was opened at tea time I'm not sure. Albert's memory seems a bit blurred on that point, probably another result of the frontal lobotomy mentioned in the last issue.

Over twenty years later, between 1976 and 1978, when they'd both grown up into respectable, God-fearing young men (Huh!), Billy had bought the farm in Wales. Albert visited him regularly and was helping him to "do it up". Billy dug the ponds and Albert put in the kitchen units and the loft insulation. They called it "Polyfilla Farm". They also found the time to play Scrabble and visit the local pub. I wonder if they had cakes after tea.

CLEM

IT'S a knock-out L.P. Already in the charts and selling supremely, "We Want Billy" represented an ambition reached for Billy Fury. The chance to sing material HE liked in front of a responsive audience of hundreds of his fans. A "live" recording.

But what makes Billy tick? Why has he developed so consistently over the years. Man to give an answer is Clem Cattini, drummer with the Tornados—group who've backed Billy on all his dates. The group who were on that "We Want Billy" album.

The set-up

I talked with Clem as we played over the disc. Got his reactions. Heard the behind-the-scenes set-up.

"It took all day," said Clem. "We had two separate audiences but ran through both sides of the album for each gathering. First off, Tony Hall introduced each Tornado. Then we swung straight into 'Sweet Little Sixteen' and Billy slipped quickly out of a door by









the control panel. You can hear the screams. Fantastic."

Clem listened to the opener for a moment. "Such a lovely feel to Billy's voice. No getting away from it. He really gets to grips with this Chuck Berry number. 'Course, being in the box, we couldn't hear all

that was going on with the earphones and so on. But I like Bill better on this kind of material. I think he enjoys doing it more than the usual single-type ballads.

"Now hear 'Baby Come On'. We didn't know this one until the morning of the session. But Bill's just fine. Next comes 'That's All

Right'. He starts it slowly
... you can feel the tense
excitement build up. It was
Bill's idea to speed up midway. I have to follow him
on the beat and tempo. Out
front, Billy was grafting
hard. The effect got us
going. We all got the
audience going.

"'Sticks and Stones'? Yes, Bill dug this one up from a Ray Charles album. Listen to that feeling in his voice again. He does all these numbers from time to time on stage—except 'Baby Come On'. Now comes 'Unchain My Heart'. Get that coloured approach to his singing.

"And you know every movement he makes counts. A lot of them, I have to follow with a bang on the bass drum. You know, Billy completely loses himself when he's working. Kind of gone — you think he's oblivious to everything.

"Here comes 'I'm Moving On'. Used to be his closer on stage. He builds and



builds like mad. He can't stop himself writhing like a snake. A Hank Snow number, of course.

"You hear those screams even when he's not singing? It's just a movement made by Bill. He can control an audience beautifully. Like I

Clem re-lived just about every moment of this exciting L.P. Then he said: "Working with Billy is really an experience. I don't think any singer has shown so much improvement over the years. Fans who just hear him on his singles don't realise how good he is on the Chuck Berry and Ray Charles sort of stuff.

Shy person

"He's the sort of bloke who knows exactly what he wants, musically. He works on his own intuition. He really is a shy person, you know. But he loses himself completely once he gets the rhythm going inside him. said, everything he does has a meaning.

"This on's 'Just Because'. He used that, too, as a stage closer. More of that coloured style of singing. That double-ending is effective, too. He just stops dead . . . says 'Hah' . . . and off goes that riot of reaction.

"The second side has his old hits. Working with Blil is really hard work. We were whacked by mid-way. But a satisfied kind of whacked, if you see what I mean. Of course, we were nervous. You can't help that feeling.

Early hits

"Now we come to those early hits. Like 'Halfway To Paradise', 'I'd Never Find Another You', 'Once Upon A Dream'—all with a special key-change link. We just went straight through the lot. Some of the tempi were changed from the original singles.

"Then, right at the end, we used the intro to 'Sticks And Stones' to get Billy off. Everybody just joined in on the 'We Want Billy' chant. Fantastic and ear-splitting. Bill didn't hang about, though. He'd have been mobbed. By the time the fans got outside, Billy was probably back in his flat having a cuppa."

"He's a thorough professional. That's a lot rarer than you'd think. I think he's one of the most exciting performers on the scene—and I'd think so even if we weren't working with him."

Dig this L.P—and see if you don't agree.

*Letter from Moya Gleave in New Zealand re Billy's mums recent visit there. "It was touch and go whether Jean made it or not as she wasn't well leading up to the departure date, so Albert had his name on the ticket as well - just in case. But she made it and arrived on 15th April 2 days before opening nite. Spent all day catching up on all the news. Thursday morning I left her in bed while I went to make a start on the hall walls. Came home in the afternoon and went back again that nite to finish the decorating. Then back again Friday morning to set up the tables etc (leaving Jean in the hands of the hairdresser who came to the house). I wouldn't let Jean anywhere near the hall until we went back for the actual 'do' before everyone arrived. She burst into tears when she walked into the hall and got the full impact of it all. It looked stunning (even tho I do say so myself) and when she slapped eyes on the Billy mannequin standing in the Royal Box next to her seat wearing the gold lame suit and black shirt with collar turned up she went cold. There were a few times during the show she was dabbing her eyes. Like I had a tape of Billy talking she hadn't heard before. One item where all the girls did 'He's a Star' wearing white shirts and black pants back to front (I had changed the words to How Bizarre to He's a Star the chorus went - "Every time we turn around, you see his face" - we all turned round and had a mask of Billy's face on the back of our heads - all these Billy's! Then she bawled again when we did the folding of the flag (big white sheet with huge Billy

logo on) and did the Trilogy - Glory, Glory Billy Fury, his soul goes marching on. ... We have had some amazing letters telling us how much the show was enjoyed and we raised \$9,130 which was divided between The South Auckland Hospice and The Child Cancer Foundation.

I had full blown flu by the second nite, got meself so run down and we had to empty out the hall and clean up. Spent Sunday sorting it all out into piles to be returned to a million places. Sunday nite after the doctor had made a house call to me to give me a shot in the arm, we went to Hamilton to see Gerry & The Pacemakers as Jean knew him from the old days. We were meant to stay the night at a friends but all I wanted to do was come home and crawl into my own bed - so we came home. Monday it was racing all over everywhere returning stuff (costumes etc), Tuesday was meant to be a rest day but as I hadn't finished Monday's jobs I was out again all day, then tea and packing up to go away the next day. The following 3 weeks we spent in Rotorua, The Bay of Islands, Taupo and Pauanui doing the touristy bitz; the last few days around Auckland and We did our best to ensure Jean had the best there's heapz to see here. possible time in the short time we had. It would take pages to write all the things we did. We only came back from all these places for a day here and there as we had Maggie G's housewarming party. Also a week later we did another show at the posh Sheraton Hotel, a few more dollars earned from that to buy a brick with 'The Billy Fury Fan Club' on it for the new Hospice building they are fund-raising for. We took Jean to the zoo to show her our Billy Fury brick in the new walk way.

It was Mother's Day the day she left. I gave Jean a big book on New Zealand and she gave me a gorgeous gold bracelet which Billy had given her in 1961. She said he bought her 3 gold bracelets over the years - one she gave to her other daughter-in-law Marie! I believe Jean gave you one also, Maureen, with the snakes on. Anyway I will treasure that bracelet. She phoned when she got back to Liverpool to say she was home, tired and starving hungry coz she hadn't slept or eaten and had feet like 2 puddin's. She was lucky on the flights - upgraded to business class both ways. It's not what you know! Moya Gleave New Zealand



Or Bessie Braddock, the much loved Liverpool Labour MP, a big


lady in more ways than one.


