The message read "I just wanted to inform you that the Billy Fury Web Site has won an award! It's some sort of 50's and 60's music legacy award. I was about to dash off to work this morning so I didn't have enough time to read the whole message, but I'll let you know about it as soon as possible – Nalle The Happy Graphic Designer". I sent a congratulatory message back to him with a request that he send me more information when he could. Today, I got the second e mail which reads:-

"Dear Jean - About the award, The Billy Fury Web Site has been recognised as one of the best rock 'n' roll sites on the web and as such, it has been awarded the Legacy Choice Award for Excellence. To be selected, they apply the following criterion:

- The site must be related to 60's rock 'n' roll.
- The site must provide extensive information about a band or subject not available elsewhere.
- The site is exceptionally well designed.

Legacy Links is the largest collection of 60's rock sites on the web and the Billy Fury Web Site is now linked to their central index. This naturally increases the traffic on the site. Legacy Links was founded on the 17th January 1997 by Casey Butler. Viable owner of Software Alternatives. He saw it as a means of linking the community of Classic rock 'n' roll web sites together in a cultural region of cyberspace and also as a means of encouraging and rewarding the hard work of the webmasters. In November 1998 the site was purchased by Old Goat Publishing who run it now."



QUESTION TIME

People have assumed that question time was originated by Chris Eley who would like to put the record straight and give the credit to where it's due, with Fan Club Member and avid Billy collector, Will McNeil. The questions are still being researched but the article contributed by Fan Club Member, Peter Davies, provides some of the information requested. It must be remembered that reported dates in music papers often failed to take place, and that the gruelling toll of package touring plus the passing years can make the best of memories falter. In 'Billy Fury On Stage' we hope in the future to feature as many Tour Dates as are known about (with help already provided by Tony Philbin and others), and also unreleased tracks, backing bands, etc. A lot of research is obviously involved in this. The BBC radio sessions are also to be listed, but given that they have confused Saturday Club with Top of the Pops on some listings, more work is needed there also! More general information can be found on Nalle Westman's Web Site on the Internet and in the booklet notes of the available CDs.

More questions from Will will appear, together with whatever answers are available, in future issues of the magazines. Meanwhile, I'm sure the information from Ray Randall, a former 'Tornado' will prove of interest. Special thanks are due to Peter Davies for his efforts in obtaining the information, and to Ray Randall for imparting it, it's this kind of participation that makes things so much more interesting for everyone, including those of us at the Sound of Fury. Thanks also to Tony Philbin for his contribution regarding Billy's Tour Dates, hopefully for inclusion in the next issue.

RE: "THE TORNADOS"

I refer to your question on page 33 of 'Sound of Fury' issue number six and thought that you would be interested to hear of the following.

About one year ago in my business as Estate Agent I was invited to visit a lady's house one evening to value and place the house on the market in Great Harwood, near Blackburn, Lancashire. During my visit I noticed that there were some musical instruments and paraphernalia of a musician in one of the bedrooms. She explained that she and her partner were moving to Whitby, Yorkshire and he was a professional musician. His name is Ray Randall and he was a member of the second generation group The Tornados, having taken over as bass player from Heinz Burt. I had a long discussion with Ray much of it concerning Billy. In due course the property was sold and they moved to Whitby, but kept in touch. Ray is currently appearing on stage in the North Yorkshire area.

During January 1999 I received a tape from Jenny and Ray which was an interview which was broadcast by BBC Radio Cleveland on 27 December 1998 called 'Dave Wiseman's 60s Souvenir'. Apparently this programme links up with other North East radio stations. So some readers of 'The Sound of Fury' may have heard the programme.

The tape of the programme included a lot of 60s music particularly from the Joe Meek productions at that time. Ray Randall apparently worked for Joe in his London studio and spoke affectionately of his experiences in the sixties.

Among the quotes extracted from the programme he says:

'The highlight for me was backing Billy Fury. We would play our hits to moderate appreciation but when Billy came on stage the whole place would just erupt. It was like Beatlemania but before the Beatles. He would come on and we wouldn't be able to hear what we were playing for the whole of the act.

I don't know what it was with him, he looked good and moved well and he had, as far as I was concerned, a brilliant voice. I have to be honest and I might be biased but I preferred him to Elvis Presley really, and I think if Larry Parnes had got him into the States he would have done well out there, but it was never to be.

Larry Parnes apparently said that 'If you don't have Billy Fury then you don't get The Tornados', so the Americans said 'Well we will go without', and that was our American tour down the drain really, and I think you can probably get away with it in the UK, but I don't think you can deal with the Americans like that.

I think The Tornados would have gone on for quite some time if we had gone to the States and I think it would have made an awful lot of difference. Whether they would have accepted us I don't know, but I think it probably was the beginning of the end for us.

Joe Meek was not particularly liked in the business and was a very hard businessman. There was one night, I think it was in South London playing one of the Gaumonts when they closed during the day for the stage show. Joe had come along to the show and Larry Parnes said to Ray Randall 'When Billy comes on stage stand back because the spotlights are picking up your white hair'. So I stood right back and then Joe in the interval said 'What are you doing standing back?' So I said that Larry had told me when Billy comes on stage, to stand back. So he said I am your Manager and when Billy comes out I want your hair to be picked up in the spotlight. So I spent the second set of the show walking backwards and forwards! It was very difficult actually and Joe wasn't really cut out for business, he was a great engineer but not for business.'

Ray Randall was apparently with The Tornados from September 1963 to 1966 starting toward the end of the season in Great Yarmouth and then touring for the remainder of 1963 with Billy and Dicky Pride, playing a total of 82 venues. Apparently The Tornados line up on Billy's Tour was:

Ray Randall (Bass Guitar) – replaced Brian Gregg who had replaced Heinz Burt
Stuart Taylor (Lead Guitar) – replaced Alan Caddy
Bryan Irwin (Rhythm Guitar) – sadly died recently at Christmas 1998
Jimmy O'Brien (Keyboards)
Clem Cattini (Drums) (still with The Tornados)
Stuart Taylor left (The Tornados about 1965 – Asst.Ed) to join Dusty Springfield.

(Although there are contracts post 1964, naming Billy Fury and The Tornados, and some radio show introductions post '64 mentioning The Tornados, Billy was backed from early 1964 by The Gamblers, and then in 1967, by the Plainsmen – Asst. Ed)

Ray also remembers Joe Brown (by this time a star in his own right – Asst. Ed) entering his dressing room during the tour and saying that J.F.K. had been shot (22.11.63) and also that there were late dates in Holland during the tour. Lee Everett was with them and bought Ray a pair of clogs!

Billy apparently did a few numbers live on a Dutch Radio show, does anyone out there please have any transcripts? (Asst. Ed)

MORE ANSWERS TO QUESTION TIME By Maureen Bowden

Question 7 asked about unreleased songs in Billy's stage repertoire. He used to sing the old blues song "If you Don't Want You Don't Have to Get Into Trouble". You'll remember the cleaned up version by The Evs and Ray Charles released as "Leave My Woman Alone". The original, which Billy sang was "earthier". I heard him do it on the Liverpool Empire in 1959 or 1960.

His mum Jean remembers him singing "Old Shep", also on the Liverpool Empire. The audience stopped screaming and it was very quiet then she dropped a bag of mint balls and they all went "plop plop plop" down the steps in the circle.

Question 9 asked when Joe Brown ceased to be in Billy's band. He was never actually in Billy's band although he played on "The Sound of Fury" LP. Clare met Joe recently and he told her any time he played with Billy he was helping out as a friend.

Another packed, light hearted and successful Mill Hill gathering on January 24th. Lots of new faces, and young ones, which is always so important for the future. I believe Billy would have been chuffed to see so many young bikers paying their respects, he was so keen on bikes and speed himself.

Mill Hill regular Dave McMaster was much missed, we hope you're feeling a great deal better now Dave after such a big op. Sad to hear of the passing of Tony Tait who, we are told, was once a member of one of Billy's backing bands.

Thanks to everyone who took part in the surprise and signed a 50th birthday card for me, also to Frank Bull for his vote of thanks, it was a nice way to finish off my birthday week. It's sad to hear that Frank is unwell again – get well soon Mate!

The night before Linda and I were lucky enough to get to the Elvis Concert at Wembley. It was a stunning night, and great to see the original 1970s band line up, especially James Burton, who did such a good job for Elvis, later on for Jerry Lee Lewis, and of course, the great Ricky Nelson, long before the Elvis connection. The Aloha from Hawaii video shots of Elvis were, in particular, stunning, and the event worked on most levels. There was, however, such an underlying current of sadness because he really wasn't there, I suspect that's why there was an unusually subdued response to American Trilogy, always a real Tour de Force.

This year Elvis is being touted by RCA as Artist of the Century. The worldwide jury is out as to whether it's Elvis or Sinatra, but not in this house, sorry Frank! The new Elvis CD Sunrise 07 863 676752 contains the seminal and absolutely essential Sun recordings. I prefer Billy's live version of 'Baby Let's Play House' (BBC Documentary) but 'That's All Right' 'Mystery Train' and especially 'Trying To Get To You' are brilliant. The previously unreleased track 'It wouldn't be the Same Without You' is interesting, but a couple of plays is enough. Some of the tracks on side 2 are the equivalent of Billy's first recordings on his P.F. Philips 78, which were 'I'm Left, You're Right, She's Gone' (there are 4 original versions on Sunrise), 'Have I Told You Lately That I Love You', 'Love's a Callin', 'Paralysed', and 'Come Go With Me' (the latter title being a misnomer, it's really a self written number which could more accurately be called 'Baby'). A big thank you to Cy Moy for his contribution to the Mill Hill raffle, the lady who brought in those huge boxes of chocs, and everyone else who brought stuff in, we need it folks (especially Billy associated stuff, but of course chocs and gifts etc. are always welcome). Thanks are due too, to Cy for his 'Fun Dances', which raise money for the Bronze Fund, if only more of Billy's fans could do similar events we would get to our goal quicker. I would like to say a big thanks to those other (same old faces) who continually, even if they can't afford to, donate to the Bronze and to the Heart Charities. A big thanks to Brendan Dodd for contributing the autographs, and to new Fan Club member John Giles who ended up with one of them!

Albert's plaintive tribute to Billy is now out 'I Never Met Colette', I think purchase details are elsewhere in the magazine. This is a very nice little picture disc package, well worth having, 4 tracks including the tribute title song, the previously released 'Helpless',

'I Know I've got a Heart' plus a new one that I particularly enjoy, 'Believe in Love'. The Documentary is due to be re-shown in the autumn, with repeats (thanks for the info Paul – let's hope you do win the award). 'That'll be the Day' is now available on video again, as part of a double with 'Stardust'. Available from HMV, Tower etc. quite cheaply, Warner Brothers SO 38342 (the picture of Billy is far too small!).

Paul Anka's 'Diana' is a kind of classic but for me the best version by far is by Conway Twitty, a guy who could really sing, in the almost over the top style of Ral Donner. This great version, along with solid versions of 'Handy Man' 'Treat Me Nice' and 'Long Black Train' (Conway's equivalent of Elvis's 'Mystery Train') can be found on Globe CD 283 (specialist dealers only). Another option is to shell out for the (expensive!) Bear Family boxed set. The best option currently is to pick up 'The World of Conway Twitty' Spectrum S51-432-2, a snip at £5.99 with not only the above (less 'Long Black Train') but a quite wonderful 'Blue Moon' with a spoken intro which sounds like James Stewart. 'Lonely Blue Boy', 'It's Only Make Believe' and 'Blueberry Hill' are superb of course, but 'Unchained Melody' is a disaster. Still one really duff track out of 20 isn't bad. Also on here is 'What am I Living For', good, but not up to Billy's treatment of the song. Another quite different version of 'Diana' can be found on the new Bobby Vee double CD 'Hits of the Rockin' 50s/with Strings and Things, BGO CD 444. The vocal mix is a little lop-sided, but the Crickets style drumming drives it along in an enjoyable way; perhaps this is how Buddy Holly would have tackled it. Still on the subject of Vee there is another really nice 2-1 CD release, perhaps two of the best of his albums (except for the Crickets backed tracks). Take Good Care of My Baby/Recording Session, BGO CD 438 includes 'He Will Break Your Heart' (from the Billy 'Halfway' LP). That's five versions that I know of, Billy, Johnny Rivers, Bobby Vee, Ben E King and Jerry Butler, all of them slightly different (anyone know of any others?). I think the last one was the hit one. Anyway, great stuff here, 'You Better Move On', 'What's Your Name', 'Forget Me Not' (a cover of Eden Kane's classic), the brilliant 'I Can't Say Goodbye', 'Golden Chance', 'Will You Still Love Me Tomorrow', a superior cover (sorry Ed and Frank)!, of Adam Faith's 'Who am I' plus a whole lot of hits, 'Sharing You' etc. Essential for lovers of early 60s pop.

Mike Berry is a real gentleman, in the mould of Dave Sampson and other artists we know, so its nice to see a brand new CD, 'Rock n Roll Daze' Roller Coaster RCCD 6002. Not all of the 16 newly recorded tracks work but most do. They range from competent and enjoyable to really good. I especially like the Ricky Nelson covers, the inevitable Buddy covers, 'Rave On' in particular, and even 'Only the Lonely' works, great effort Mike (and a brave one in tackling an Orby number!)

Right in the middle of doing this column I got a surprise telephone call from St Louis, Narvel Felts on tour, about to fly to another gig in the South. A new CD of rockabilly style material is due for release soon, more details when available. 
that we may have missed, good luck to everyone undergoing a tough time at present, for whatever reason.

BILL REMEMBERS

Personal memories of Bill Forbes who appeared
On "Oh Boy" and "Thank Your Luck Stars" with Billy
Interviewed by Maureen Bowden

It was 1959, Bill Forbes was a young singer who was appearing regularly on "Oh Boy". He and Billy became good friends and Billy stayed with him for a while at his London flat. During the day they would hang around the coffee bars in the West End. One of their favourite places was "The Bread Basket" in Tottenham Court Road. They used to go there with Emile Ford, Jimmy Justice and Jim Dale.

On one of the "Oh Boy" shows Jack Good had the idea of having Joe from the Dallas Boys as a lead singer with the solo stars making up his vocal backing group. The "Super Group" consisted of Marty, Cliff, Billy and Bill Forbes.

On another occasion Billy and Bill were both appearing on "Thank Your Lucky Stars". A craze for yoyos had hit the country at the time and all the artistes were asked to pose for publicity photos playing with them. (Have a look at the inside cover of mag number five.)

Bill remembers Billy as being very quiet and unassuming and a good friend.

Bill himself is a genuine, charming guy. Many thanks to Alan Haigh for putting me in touch with him.



I put an ad in the last mag for help with typing. We now have four volunteers so the Phantom Typist has three Assistants and one who will help out in emergencies. My thanks to Julie Runicles and Cecelia Darville who will be kept busy by Chris and Kelly Warner who is Maureen's typist. Once Pat Donaldson has recovered from her op she'll be happy to help out if we need her. Lolly Whitaker has for some time been printing out our mag labels on her computer thereby saving me hours and hours of typing them on my trusty typewriter. Thanks girls, now I can get some beauty sleep. Thanks also go to Jenny Paine for being Chris' temporary typist until we could find a more permanent solution.

GONNA TYPE A LETTER

* I'm now aged 52. When I was 17, Billy's "I'd Never Find Another You" was in the charts. He used to come to Woolwich with Marty Wilde, etc. I wrote to him and asked if I could meet him backstage sometime. I enclosed a photo and told him I'd had polio when I was 10 which had left me with a limp. Since I heard "Maybe Tomorrow" I'd been in love with the Sound of Fury.

He replied, inviting me to tea at 4 o'clock at the Great Cumberland Hotel, London. Hal Carter picked me up at 88 Hudson Rd, Plumstead in a limousine. I wore a kookie dress, bouffant hair style, white shoes and bag. We arrived late after being caught in traffic. Larry Parnes and Billy were there to greet me. There were white plush carpets everywhere and a white poodle. The furniture was bamboo. We had sandwiches and cake on silver plates and tea in silver cups.

Billy was tall, so very, very handsome and shy, very modest, a perfect Prince Charming. I wished I was Cinderella. I was completely in adoration of him, he was wonderful and so kind. After saying goodbye to Billy and Larry Parnes I was driven home by Hal Carter.

There were no cameras, newspaper reporters or other people there. I was the only girl. Billy did this for an ordinary fan like me. Just like Billy's song I'll never "Forget Him" and "I'd Never Find Another You" Billy.

My Mum's birthday is a couple of week's after Christmas and One Saturday, in 1986, for my Mum's 36th Birthday, at the tender age of 15, I went to the local shops to find mummy a gift.

Knowing of my mum's love of songs and music, I went into, "Hollywood Nites", a record store on the comer. I didn't have much money, but I looked at a few different albums that I thought my mum might like.

After a while I chose an album by Diana Ross and took it home to my mum.

Upon opening it, she was thrilled and said that she was pleased with her present. I replied, "Phew, thank God, I wasn't too sure. It was either Diana Ross or someone called Billy Fury." My mum's eyes lit up and she said, "Oh Billy Fury's excellent, that too would have been nice."

I returned the Diana Ross album to the shop and exchanged it for, "The Billy Fury Hit Parade." When I got home, my mum put it on straight away, singing to all her favourites. I remember a couple of songs, at the time, that struck a chord with me. "A Thousand Stars" and "Halfway to Paradise".

After that, I became one of Billy Fury's greatest fans. I found out that he was buried nearby, after an article in the local newspaper and frequently visited my idol.

Over the years my mum was so surprised at my liking of Billy. She said that if a fortune-teller told her, when she was 16, that she would get married and have children that would have posters of Billy Fury on their bedroom wall, like she once did, she would have totally dismissed the idea. How could it be that in 30 years time, a completely new generation would be fans of Billy Fury?!!

Unfortunately, as you grow older, along with work and other commitments, life ties you down and you can't always continue attending all the various Billy functions that occur. Sadly, with this in mind, life changes and One Saturday, last year, I found my dear Mum semi-conscious in her bed. I shouted to my brother, Marino, to call an ambulance and my mum was rushed to Barnet General Hospital.

My Dad came home minutes later and we went to the hospital, where the doctor told us that my mum had a major bleed in her head, a subarachnoid haemorrhage. There was nothing that could be done but to "let nature take its course".

My mum meant everything to me. Maybe now she's in Paradise with the peace she so dearly wanted and deserved. Music and Songs were the most important thing to my mum after her family. Although she's at peace now, along with Billy, I no longer have her Loving arms to Run to.

THE WYCHERLEY FAMILY

By George & Teresa Wycherley of Coventry



In this family photo taken about 1890 is the great-grandfather of Billy Fury. Can you spot any resemblance? Walter Wycherley is standing at the back, second from the right. In fact from his dress, the occasion may well have been his wedding day. With him in the photo are his parents and his seven brothers and sisters. The pretty child sitting on his mother's knee is actually a boy. My grandfather, Richard (Walter's brother) is seated on the right at the front. In 1909, their eldest sister, Annie Louise (standing back left) emigrated with her husband and six children to Nebraska, USA. One day their daughter Alice went to the assistance of a large lady whose long skirts had got caught as she was getting out of her horse-drawn buggy. They became good friends and the lady offered her a job at her ranch named "Scouts Rest". The lady was Louise Cody (Mrs Buffalo Bill).

THE WYCHERLEY FAMILY

Wycherley's had lived in Shropshire for centuries (the earliest recorded is 1398). About 1881, William and Mary Wycherley and the children migrated to Birkenhead where William's blacksmithing skills were used in the shipyards. Walter as young as thirteen followed the same trade. What a coincidence that nearly eighty years later, Billy Fury got his big show biz break after appearing at "The Essoldo" in Birkenhead.

The family moved again and at the time of the photo were living at 122 Stanley Road Liverpool. By 1909 William and Mary had crossed back over the Mersey and spent the rest of their lives at 9 Palatine Road in Wallasey. William died in 1914 but Mary lived on until the 1940s. Walter Wycherley was living at 5 Beattie Street in Bootle in 1896 where his son Albert (Billy's grandfather) was born. Albert's son, also named Albert (Billy's dad) was born at 29 Barnet Street, West Derby, Liverpool in 1918. Of course after that, as they say, "the rest is history".
